Legionella control

The Public Health Act 2010 and the Public Health Regulation 2012 commence on **1 September 2012**. To support implementation of the Act and Regulation, a series of Information Sheets has been developed to outline the key requirements in relation to particular areas. What is the definition of a 'regulated system' for *Legionella* control purposes?

Under the *Public Health Act 2010* and *Public Health Regulation 2012*, a regulated system is defined as any of the following:

- an air-handling system, a system designed to direct air in a positive and controlled manner to and from specific enclosures by various means,
- a hot water system, which heats and delivers water at a temperature of at least 60°C to each outlet point,
- a humidifying system, for adding moisture to air in order to raise its humidity,
- a warm-water system which heats and delivers water at a temperature of less than 60°C at each outlet point, or
- a water-cooling system, which is a device for lowering the temperature of water or other liquid by evaporative cooling such as a cooling tower.

However, the Act and Regulation do not apply to:

- a regulated system (other than a water-cooling system) installed in a private dwelling,
- a warm-water system that is installed in any premises other than a hospital (which is defined to include a nursing home), or
- a water-cooling system installed in any premises and used solely for making snow.

Who do the requirements of the *Public Health Act 2010* and the *Public Health Regulation 2012* apply to, in relation to regulated systems?

The requirements of the *Act* and *Regulation* in relation to regulated systems apply to the occupier of premises where the regulated system is installed.

The requirements also apply to a contractor, known as a duly qualified person, who is engaged to install, operate or maintain the regulated system. This includes cooling tower operators and service personnel.

Why has the legislation related to regulated systems been revised?

The revised *Regulation* is designed to better protect public health and has been updated to reflect contemporary references and practices.

The *Regulation* will also allow more streamlined and flexible enforcement practices and the penalties for breaches have been significantly increased.

The new *Regulation* replaces the *Pu*blic Health (Microbial Control) Regulation 2000.

Legionella control

What are the key requirements under the new legislation for the occupier of premises where a regulated system is installed, and/or for the duly qualified person engaged to operate and maintain the regulated system?

An occupier of premises at which a regulated system is installed, and/or the duly qualified person engaged to operate and maintain the system, will be required to comply with the *Act* and *Regulation*. These requirements include:

- Notifying the local council of the existence of water-cooling systems and warm-water systems. Councils may charge a notification fee
- Ensuring that all regulated systems are installed, commissioned, operated and maintained in accordance with requirements prescribed in the *Regulation*
- Following the provisions of Australian / New Zealand Standard AS/NZS 3666:2011 *Air handling and water systems of buildings* which are adopted for some of the prescribed requirements of the Regulation
- Ensuring all water-cooling systems are equipped with a disinfection procedure designed to control microbial growth that is certified annually by a competent person and that is in operation at all times.

Which parts of the *Act* and the *Regulation* relate to an occupier of premises at which a regulated system is installed?
