

Important information for residents and businesses



Rates

The rates you pay allows Council to fund essential infrastructure and services. They are also used to keep our community clean, safe, assessable, connected and growing.

There are various methods available to pay your rates, ranging from coming into one of Council Contact Centres or making an on-line payment. The back of the Rates Notice shows the payment options available.

If you are having difficulty paying your rates, please contact Council to discuss a payment arrangement.

Bin collection

The collection days depend on where you live and you can find this out by calling Council or you can find the information on our website. Each residential property in Cumberland is provided a general waste bin (red lid) and a recycling bin (yellow lid).

It is important that you always put waste in the right place. Your general waste bin is to be used to place food waste, bags of household waste, foam and nappies. Your recycle bin is to be used to place empty plastic bottles and containers, cardboard and paper, steel and aluminium cans, aerosols and glass bottles and jars. Your garden waste bin is to be used to place small twigs, flower pruning and cuttings, grass clippings and leaves. If your bin goes missing or is damaged you can have it repaired or replaced by contacting Council on **8757 9000**.



Recycling

It is important that you always put waste in the right place. Here is a list of the only things that should go in your yellow lidded recycling bin:

- Empty plastic bottles and containers
- Cardboard, cartons and clean pizza boxes (please flatten before adding to your bin)
- Paper all types
- Empty aluminium, steel and aerosol cans
- Glass bottles and jars

Braille Bin Lid Stickers: Council has braille bin lid stickers to help people who are blind or have low vision to recycle. Contact Council to get free braille bin lid stickers.

Book a household clean up service

If you have bulky household waste like whitegoods or furniture that cannot be reused or recycled you can book a Council clean up. Council provides four free clean-up services to each household per year. A limit of 2 cubic metres (about a small trailer size) per collection. Acceptable items include: furniture, white goods, tied and bundled branches and floor coverings and mattresses.

You need to call Council or go online to make a booking for this service. You will be given a date for your collection and need to place the items out the night before for collection. Booking is essential and terms and conditions apply. Check Council's website for further details.



Community recycling service for problem waste

If you have any of the following items to dispose of you can book a problem waste collection where Council recycles and/or safely disposes of these items:

- Paint tins
- BBQ gas bottles or fire extinguishers
- Car or household batteries.
- Motor or cooking oil
- Electronic waste- small appliances, tvs or computers
- Smoke detectors
- Fluoro globes and tubes



You must book your collection by going to **problemwaste.com.au** or call Council. Terms and conditions apply, check Councils website for further details.

Commercial waste service

Council provides waste and recycling services to commercial premises. Further details on bin sizes, service frequency and cost can be found on Council's website.



Ashestos

Council offers a range of asbestos awareness initiatives for you to better understand asbestos and safe disposal methods. We provide several free services to increase local recognition and understanding of asbestos.

Community sharps

Council has partnered with local pharmacies to provide a safe needle/syringe disposal service for diabetic and other sharps users in the community. Participating pharmacies and other locations are available on Council's website.





Organic and food waste reduction

Composting and worm farming are natural ways to recycle your organic garden and food waste. To help you start a compost or worm farm at home Council can offer you a rebate of up to \$50 for any compost bin or worm farm you buy, workshops on how to get started and general information and troubleshooting tips.





Household Chemical Clean Out

Council works with the NSW Environmental Protection Authority (NSW EPA) to provide you with a free and environmentally-safe opportunity to dispose of your unwanted household chemicals.

It's a great opportunity for you to clean out your cupboards, garages, sheds and laundries of unwanted chemicals and drop them at Council to be recycled or disposed of correctly.

Community Recycling Station

Cumberland City Council has installed new Problem Waste Drop-Off Stations at eight different locations across Cumberland City and replaced the existing small collection units for household batteries and mobile phones at these locations.

These small Problem Waste Drop-off Stations aim to provide an easy and convenient way for residents to recycle or safely dispose of household problem wastes items such as batteries, mobile phones and x-rays that are not allowed in the household kerbside bins.

Illegal dumping

If someone places waste on a Council nature strip, outside their home or any other public land without making a clean-up booking, this is considered illegal.

Dumping of waste pollutes the environment, is a safety risk to the community and makes our area look unclean. People who dump waste in this way are guilty of an offence and could be fined up to \$8,000.

Please report illegal dumpers by recording number plates, if safe to do so, and taking photos if possible. This will help with investigations.

Animals

Did you know that you are legally required to have your dogs and cats microchipped and pay a lifetime registration fee? This is to help protect your pet if it's hurt, lost or stolen.

Council also responds if stray or lost animals are reported.

Backyard pools

Drowning is a leading cause of accidental death in young children. With over 300,000 backvard swimming pools in NSW, swimming pool safety is a vital issue that affects the whole community. Swimming pools must be compliant with Australian laws.

Register your pool: You must register your pool, and Council will inspect the pool in due course to ensure fencing and barriers are safe for children. Laws are in place when it comes to children around swimming pools.

Trees

You need to get Council's permission before you can cut back or remove a tree. To find out what steps you need to take, please visit Council's website or call Council on 8757 9000.





Developing your land

You need to get Council's permission if you are planning on:

- Using land
- Subdividing land
- Erecting a building
- Carrying out development work
- Demolishing a structure
- Any other development that requires development consent

To get development consent, you need to lodge a Development Application (DA) with Cumberland City Council. To find out what steps you need to take, please visit Council's website or call Council on 8757 9000 and speak to a Development Enquiry Officer. It is also a good idea to talk to your neighbours as early as possible about your intention on developing your land.

If you operate a hospitality business and would like to utilise footpath space for outdoor dining, Council can assist in providing advice and a streamlined application process.





Food Business and Public Health

Council together with the NSW Food Authority runs programs for businesses to improve hygiene standards for food management. This includes online training and food safety excellence recognition programs.

Council's Environmental Health Service team also interacts with food businesses including mobile, temporary and homebased businesses, skin penetration businesses and industrial businesses around environmental controls.

The Cumberland City Council Food Matters Information Guide provides food retailers with current information on food safety matters and promoting good food safety practices.

Safety

Long day care

Cumberland City Council operates eight Long Day Care Centres for children birth to school age. The centres provide a safe and stimulating environment for children, which helps transition them towards school.

Council's centres comply with National Quality Standards and provide quality services to cater to the needs of individual children. Long Day Care offers an education-based preschool program which aims to meet the needs of children, stimulate further learning and prepare children for school.





Family day care

Cumberland City Council's Family Day Care is a quality education and child care service that offers professional and supervised care for children up to 13 years in the private homes of approved, registered Family Day Care educators. Family Day Care is managed by Council to provide the highest standards of quality care for children in a secure and stimulating home environment.

Family Dare Care offers flexible care hours and multicultural educators which are ideal for all families, including shift workers, on-call employees, single parents and parents from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.



Out of school hours care (OOSH)

Council operates before and after school care centres catering for children starting from kindergarten to the age of 13 years who attend primary school in the Cumberland Local Government area and surrounding areas. The centres provide a range of recreational activities in a safe enjoyable atmosphere. Children can choose what they would like to do, from sport, art and craft, group games or quiet play.

Council also offers School Holiday Care filled with exciting activities, theme days, excursions and workshops focusing on recreational and educational programs.

Community venues

Council has 23 different community venues in various locations across Cumberland. Four of these are multipurpose Community Centres staffed by Council:

Council and other organisations run many different programs and services from these staffed multipurpose Community Centres:

- English conversation classes, Health and Fitness classes, Australian Citizenship classes, JP services, Knitting program, Computer classes, Food relief, social activities)
- Run by Organisations (Playgroups, Youth Drop ins, School holiday programs, Free Legal Services, Health & Fitness classes, support services, cultural activities)
- Centre Partnerships (Educational, Employment Pathways and Employability)

Individual residents can also hire these venues for small groups, meetings, parties, community celebrations and more.

Regional parks

There are three big regional parks you can visit.

- Auburn Botanic Gardens
- Central Gardens, Merrylands West
- Holroyd Gardens, Merrylands

Each park is different, but may feature special things like native animal enclosures, native gardens, an amphitheatre, ponds and water features, adventure playgrounds, BBQ and picnic areas, walking trails, a bicycle track and more!

Sportsgrounds and tennis courts

There are 46 sportsgrounds and 10 Tennis Courts locations across Cumberland City which can be hired. These include facilities for: cricket, soccer, netball, softball, flyball, baseball, AFL, Rugby Union, rugby league and cycling.



Swimming centres and learn to swim

There are five swimming pools in Cumberland City. If you want to learn how to swim, there are classes you can join. These are located in Lidcombe, Merrylands, Granville, Guildford and Wentworthville.

- Guildford and Lidcombe Centres are indoor and outdoor Centres.
- Guildford, Lidcombe and Granville Swim centres are operational all year round.
- Merrylands and Wentworthville Swim Centres are seasonal Centres.



are required to complete the Request to Address Council form (which can be found on Council's website).

This form must be received by Council by 2pm on the day of the Council meeting. You will be allocated 3 minutes to speak on the item.

Any member of the community can put questions on any Council related topic to Council during the public forum section of the meeting.





Committees

There are 13 Advisory Committees who provide Council with advice and recommendations from local residents, service providers and other key stakeholders on matters which affect them. This includes: Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander affairs, cultural events, community safety, youth programs, parks, facilities and more.

These Committees are open for all residents to apply and appointments will be made based on meeting certain criteria and spaces available.

About Council

In Australia, there are three different levels of Government.

- 1. Federal Government is responsible for national decisions which affect all people in Australia, like immigration, trade, defence, currency and communication services.
- 2. **State Government –** is responsible for things in their own state, like schools, hospitals, water and transport.
- 3. **Local Government –** is responsible for local issues, like collecting waste, parks and building regulations.

Local Governments are also called Councils.

Cumberland City Council is the name of your Local Government. If you've lived here for a while, you may have been part of Holroyd, Auburn or Parramatta Council. In May 2016, parts of these Council areas (also called Local Government Areas or LGA) were joined together to make a new, bigger Local Government Area: Cumberland City Council.

Cumberland City Council is responsible for making the community safe, accessible and a good place to live for 242,500+ people. These people live in 29 different suburbs across 72kms².

MAP OF CUMBERLAND WARDS




